haua 2017 Annual Report

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2017 has been a remarkable year for Hatua. In 2017 our first class of university graduates began their professional careers in the fields of teaching, finance, medicine, and more. To date 100% of our alumni have successfully joined the workforce within six months of their university graduation. This year we graduated another 22 students from university, bringing our total number of alumni to 34. Additionally, we graduated 46 students from high school, bringing that total to 187 over the past 11 years in operation.

In 2017 we were also honored to be nominated for a Mombasa Business Award by the Kenya National Chamber of Commerce as Mombasa's "Outstanding Community Services Organization". These successes and recognition means so much to us. They give us the confidence of knowing that our programs have been successfully designed to meet the needs of Kenya's youth, and that together we are breaking the cycle of poverty in families throughout Likoni. It is thanks to the hard work of our students, mentors, supporters and the wonderful people whom we are fortunate to work with on Hatua's team. We thank you all.

As we walk into 2018, we are optimistic that yet another great year is ahead. We plan to reach our goal of sponsoring 400 students from Likoni in high schools and universities across Kenya. This accomplishment provides us with the opportunity to scale Hatua's programs to a new community of youth who need Hatua's support to achieve their full potential. Meet Sharon Otieno. Sharon joined Hatua's Scholarship program in 2013. Like all Hatua students Sharon Otieno was born into a low income family who couldn't afford her school fees. Without help she would have dropped out. Hatua sponsored and mentored Sharon through university, making it possible for her to graduate from Jomo Kenyatta University in Nairobi with a Degree in Medical Biochemistry. This January, Sharon began working at Unilever in Nairobi as a research and development intern.





University Career Coaching

Our professional mentoring program pairs 2nd, 3rd and 4th year university students with career coaches who work in the same fields our students want to pursue after graduation. Mentor supports the mentee by helping search for internships & jobs.

As a result university graduates are able to join the workforce, lift themselves out of poverty and join the middle class. Our goals is that once Hatua alumni become well networked within their professional circles they will serve as a "network bridge" between high and low opportunity networks within Mombasa.







Hatua Graduates Join the Workforce

Hatua graduated **20** students from university in 2017. They are now entering Kenya's workforce as educated professionals, ready to contribute to and benefit from Kenya's growing economy.



60 Promising Youth Join Hatua

Each year Hatua increases the number of scholarships we provide to deserving youth. Our goal for 2017 was to sponsor 350 students, up from 300 in 2016. We ended up sponsoring 353 in high school and university. In October we received 525 applications for students who want to join our program, and last month we invited **60** of these applicants to become the newest members of Hatua's family.

In 2018 Hatua Likoni plans to sponsor 400 students including 180 in high school and 220 in university. This year we will also begin scaling our programs to new communities to reach more youth in need of a helping hand to escape the cycle of poverty. We will launch our 2nd branch in 2018 and enroll a new cohort of scholarship students from there in Jan 2019.



<u>Geofrey Nyamongo</u> Geofrey completed his first year of high school in 2017 earning an overall average grade of A through the year and ranking in the top 2% of his class.

Sharon graduated from high school in 2017 earning a mean grade of A– on her end of secondary standardized exam. She ranked in the top 1% of her class during her senior year.



Hatua's average secondary school performance was lower in 2017 than it has been In previous years. While Hatua students usually earn a average grade of B-, they averaged C+ in 2017. This is part of a nationwide trend to discourage grade inflation in high schools. Meanwhile, the majority of Hatua students continued to rank within the top 25% of their class.




Hatua Youth Mentor 5,000+ Peers

From February to August Hatua's 2016 high school graduates worked as peer educators, facilitating life skills mentoring for youth throughout Likoni. These 46 Gap Year students taught lessons on career skills to 5,600 youth. Not only did they pass on critical information, they also developed leadership skills in the process.

- Goal setting
- Academics that support career interests
- Overcoming challenges that can derail career goals
- Initial steps in networking
- Applying for a first job





Hatua's Homework Hub of Likoni

Hatua's library plays a key role in helping students complete their school work and prepare for exams. Unlike other libraries in Kenya, which charge an entrance fee, our users access the facility without any financial barrier. As a result our library is Likoni's preferred study space for adults, youth and children.



This year Hatua continued to strengthen our four satellite libraries housed in Likoni public schools. Thanks to the Hachez Family and American Friends of Kenya we renovated a classroom roof at Shika Adabu Primary, installed library shelves and launched our 5th satellite library.







Hatua Partnerships Train Youth in Tech

Through local partnerships Hatua provides outreach programs that bring education and career opportunities to youth outside of our scholarship program. In 2017 our library was a hub for technology partnerships that served over 600 Likoni youth.

In partnership with DFID's Imarisha Vijana Program, Hatua trained 523 youth on office programs, searching the internet and using email to build their employability skills.


